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Texas Water Safari **June 11-15**

San Marcos to Seadrift

o fully understand the absurdity of the Texas Water Safari, you have to witness the 260-mile canoe race yourself. Billed as the "World's Toughest Boat Race," the water safari has been challenging adventure seekers since 1963. After the cancellation of last year's race due to COVID-19, it returns in 2021 and, like in past years, gets underway on the second Saturday of June.

Hundreds of paddlers push off from Spring Lake in San Marcos, then slog the San Marcos and Guadalupe rivers over the next few days in a quest to reach the coastal town of Seadrift. Participants have 100 hours to reach the finish line. Along

the way, they navigate canoe-flipping rapids, clamber over river-clogging logiams, wallow in mud, and try to ignore mosquitoes, alligators, and hallucinations. There is no break for the weary, not even at night.

For onlookers, the start of the race is always a spectacle, with boats of all sizes loaded with competitors dashing across the lagoon where Ralph the Swimming Pig once entertained visitors at the now-defunct Aquarena Springs theme park. If it's carnage you like, position yourself farther downstream, at Rio Vista Dam or Cottonseed Rapids. "It's always fun to watch the boats wreck," says Allen Spelce, president of Texas Water Safari.

At Staples Dam, the first official checkpoint, spectators can watch paddlers drag their crafts down steep steps and take on supplies from their bank crews. (Every team has a captain who provides supplies and morale-boosting from the riverbanks.) For a closer look, head to the river

on days two and three. By then, sleepdeprived paddlers are exhausted from the constant assault of nonstop paddling, unforgiving canoe seats, and pesky fire ants and spiders. "It's like two different races," Spelce says. "You've got the race down to Gonzales, with clear, flowing water, and after Gonzales it becomes a big, wideopen grind."

One thing you can always count on is that you never know what to expect with the Texas Water Safari. "It's the same river, but conditions change. There could be a heat wave, we could have low water, it could be full of logjams," Spelce says. "It takes just one big flood, and it's a totally different race."

Well-wishers can talk to competitors beforehand by attending the check-in from noon to 5 p.m. on June 11 at Spring Lake. The race starts at 9 a.m. the next day. For maps to course access points, go to texaswatersafari.org.
