

Dallas Blooms Festival

Feb. 20-April 11

n a chilly day last December, about 50 Dallas Arboretum and Botanical Garden workers headed into the manicured gardens along White Rock Lake, carrying hundreds of flower bulbs. Over the next three weeks, they planted half a million, all perfectly timed to burst into rivers of color during the Dallas Blooms festival.

Since 1985, Dallas Blooms has drawn thousands of visitors to the arboretum.

This year's show, themed "America the Beautiful," runs Feb. 20 to April 11. "It's the quintessential thing to do in spring in Texas," says Dave Forehand, vice president of gardens at the arboretum.

Tulips make up about two-thirds of the bulbs, but daffodils, hyacinths, and irises, plus thousands of azaleas and Japanese cherry trees, contribute to the display. Most of the bulbs are imported from Holland. Because Texas doesn't get cold enough naturally, the bulbs are pre-chilled in large coolers for six weeks before they go in the soil.

"Our horticulture team can average planting 20,000 to 25,000 bulbs a day," Forehand says. "Once we plant [them] underground, we top them with pansies and violas."

Tulips of all hues are planted just 2 to 3 inches apart to create nearly solid pools of color. "That's what makes it so stunning and dramatic." Forehand adds. "When you can combine all those colors into different patterns, it's pretty amazing."

The exhibit features early blooming, mid blooming, and late blooming flowers to produce a succession of blooms that lasts for weeks. "I say it's the most tulips you're ever going to see besides going to Holland," Forehand says. "If you can't have the trip to the Netherlands this year, just come to the arboretum."

During the pandemic, masks are required to be worn, and with capacity limited to 50 percent, tickets for specific times should be purchased in advance at dallasarboretum.org.



AUSTIN: Through March 7 "Design Shine"

Created to showcase emerging talent in the fields of architecture and design, this annual competition is presented by the Umlauf Sculpture Garden and Museum and AIA Austin. The jury yielded many impressive proposals, with two winning projects from two local teams. Drawing on themes of resiliency and empathy in times of uncertainty, each installation reinvigorates the visitor's experience with captivating, family-friendly sculptural art works. Akin to books on a shelf, Steinberg's prints formed a visual library that shaped his scholarship in fundamental ways. Selections from his over 3,500 prints illuminate the collector's insight that prints are the "circulating lifeblood of ideas," disseminating compositions, motifs, and

They offer wall art in the shape of Texas, inset with strips of painted wood. Their handcrafted pieces are made entirely from reclaimed materials, effortlessly blending rustic with modern. The pair's use of repurposed wood and paint is deeply rooted in their brand's story. "When we first started, we had very limited funds and had to get creative. We would go around and pick up broken furniture, wooden toys, fencing, siding, and other miscellaneous items and break them down to use in our pieces," Kelley says.
