Beaumont Mural Festival March 1-3

bout three years ago, Austin artist J Muzacz traveled to Beaumont to paint murals at a new restaurant/bar called Pour 09. While he and the owner, Min Dai, walked around downtown one night, Muzacz started noticing the bare brick and stucco walls of the surrounding structures. "Such cool old buildings," he said. "They'd be great for murals." The seed for the Beaumont Mural Festival was planted.

This spring, visitors can watch in real time as artists transform the blank walls

of downtown buildings in the Gulf Coast town into colorful works of art during the festival. Ten featured artists, including two from outside the United States, will participate in the free event, which was launched three years ago as part of a downtown revitalization effort.

"You're getting to see artists at work in their studio, which is out on the street," says Muzacz, who teamed up with Dai and Christina Lokey, tourism director at the Beaumont Visitors Bureau, to create the event. "There's a kid who's going to go to the festival with his parents and see a mural going up, then 20 years later say, 'I remember seeing them paint that.' That's the intangible value we add to any space."

Most of the artists will start painting on Thursday, but the main festival takes place Saturday and Sunday with music, vendors, kids' activities, live music, and food trucks at the Beaumont Event Centre. Mural sites are mostly clustered within a few blocks of the event venue and can be located through the city's online mural guide.

Artists painted 13 murals in the festival's first year. In 2023, a new slate of artists added 17 more, including a 10,000-square-foot work by Drew Merritt called *Genesis*.

"This year we're trying to stay solid at 10, because the size of these murals has grown exponentially," Lokey says. The festival also highlights the work of local artists, who paint smaller wooden cubes that will be on display at the center.

"These murals aren't just a one-and-done thing," Muzacz says. "It's an ongoing collection, and it's really adding to the community. A lot of times art is a catalyst for positive change: It allows people to see value in otherwise abandoned spaces."
