Plano Balloon Festival

Sept. 19-22

Plano

n 1979, local real estate agent Randy Wright thought he saw a UFO flying over Plano. He grabbed a pair of binoculars and realized it wasn't an extraterrestrial takeover but a hot air balloon. Inspired, he bought his own hot air balloon, which he used for advertising purposes. Later, he learned to fly it himself. Within a year, he'd help plan the first Plano Balloon Rally, which lifted off

in 1980 with 50 pilots and five balloon launches. It also propelled the North Texas city's designation as the Official Hot Air Balloon Capital of Texas.

Today, the Plano Balloon Festival celebrates its 45th year, with more than 40 balloons and pilots taking over Oak Point Park. The event expands every year, bringing thousands eager to see the vibrant hot air balloons dot the sky. "It's a kaleidoscope of colors in the air, along with specially shaped balloons that create one of the best family-friendly events in the area," says Jo Via, executive director of the festival.

A must-see attraction is the Balloon Glow, which takes place every evening of the event at sunset. As the sky turns dim, watch as the balloons light up like giant light bulbs and pilots do "all burns," when they fire their burners all at once. "The best thing about the festival is the smiles on attendees' faces as they marvel at the sight of 40 balloons aglow," Via says. During the Thursday Glow, the Plano Symphony Orchestra performs a special concert. Other evening events include parachute team jumps and drone shows, with over 200 drones creating various shapes and symbols choreographed to music.

More highlights include hot air balloon launches at sunrise on Saturday and Sunday (attendees have the opportunity to interact with pilots as they inflate the balloons on the ground), tethered balloon rides, food trucks, craft vendors, live music, children's carnival rides, and fireworks. planoballoonfest.org
